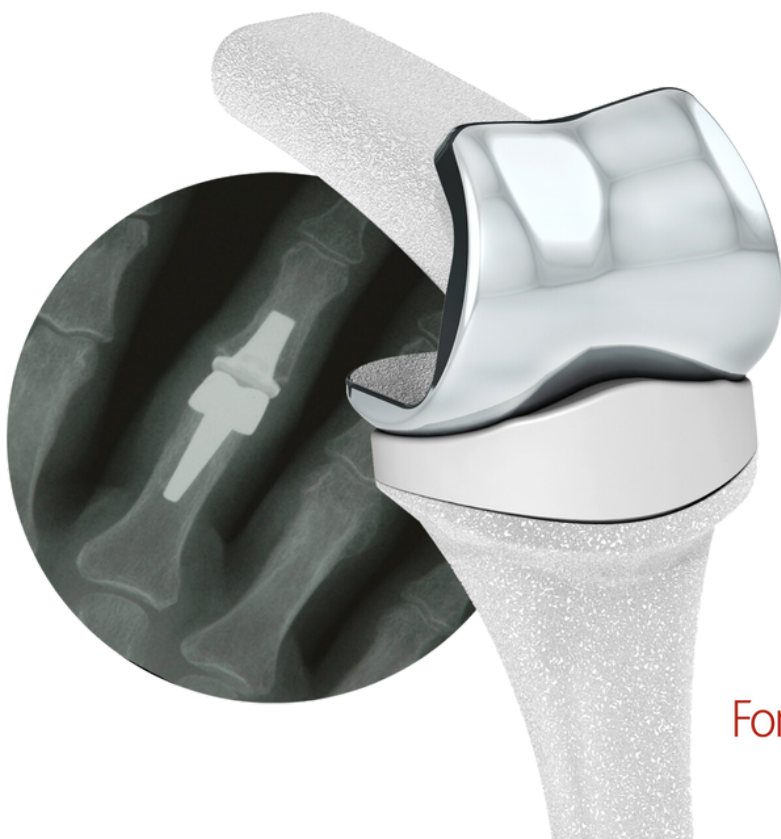

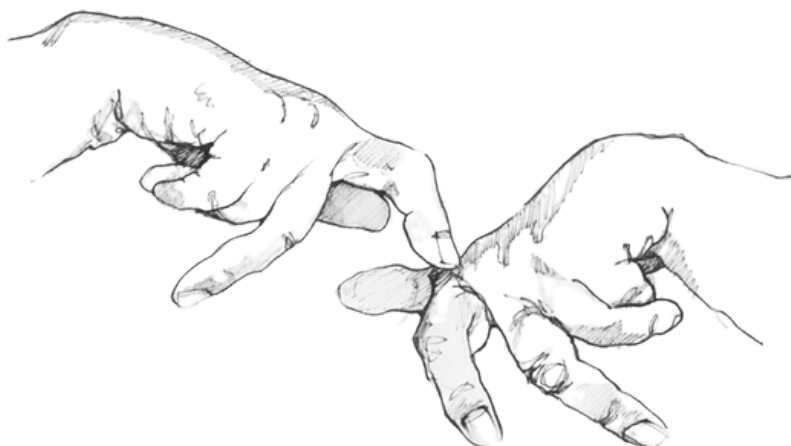

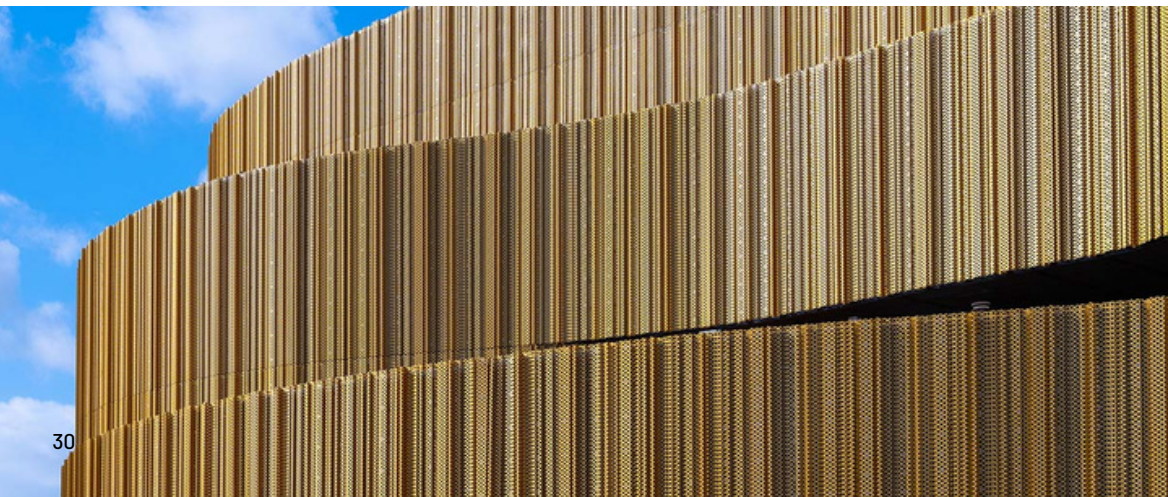

Through education and clinical training, LION aspires to become self-sufficient in the provision of specialist hand services by the end of the project.

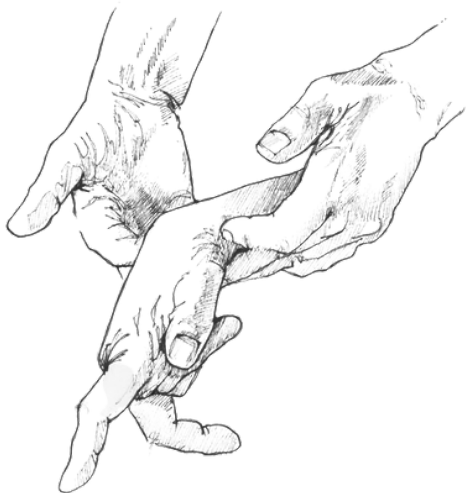
